


# January 1, 1998 Inmate Statistics

Massachusetts Department of Correction





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## **Executive Summary**

The total number of criminally sentenced individuals in DOC custody on January 1, 1998 was 10,218. The breakdown by gender was 9,619 males (94% of total population) and 599 females (6% of total population). The largest racial/ethnic group represented was Caucasian (47%), followed by African American (29%) and Hispanic (22%). The mean age of an inmate on January 1, 1998 was 35 years (for both males and females), ranging from 16 to 91 years of age. The mean age at incarceration was 30 years for the entire population and for males, 33 years for females.

Forty-five percent of the population was incarcerated for a Person offense, 21% for a Drug offense, 18% for a Sex offense, 11% for a Property offense, and 4% for an Other offense. For incarcerated females, the largest proportion of offenses fell under the Drug offense category (36%), while the largest category for incarcerated males was Person offenses (46%). Fourteen percent of the total population, or 1,403 offenders, were serving a Life sentence.

On January 1, 1998 the majority (83%) of the inmate population was incarcerated in high security level facilities (designated as security levels 4 - 6). The remaining 17% of the population was housed in lower security level facilities (security levels 1 - 3).

## **Highlights**

- The January 1, 1998 total of 10,218 inmates represents the largest first of the year DOC custody population to date. The totals were also at their highest levels for both males and females.
- From 1989 to 1998, the first of the year DOC custody population rose by 3,461 inmates, which translates to an average annual growth rate of 5% for the 10 year period.
- The DOC custody population on January 1, 1998 of 10,218 represents a one percent increase from the previous year's population of 10,119 inmates.
- The number of male inmates in the population increased 53% from January 1, 1989 to January 1, 1998 as compared to 34% for females during the same time period.
- The 1998 racial and ethnic breakdown continues a trend of slight decrease in Caucasians of the total population since 1994 from 51% to 47%, and a slight increase among Hispanics as a percentage of the total population since 1989 from 16% to 22%.
- The number of Asian inmates increased 18% from 90 in 1997 to 106 in 1998 representing the largest percent increase of any race/ethnicity category for the years 1997 to 1998.
- Although the number of younger inmates in the population has increased from 1989 to 1998, the proportion continues to decrease as it has for several years, with 19% (N = 1,316) of the population less than 25 years of age in 1989 compared to 15% (N = 1,471) in 1998.
- Inmates from 40 to 64 years of age continue to rise in proportion to the overall custody population, comprising 17% of the population in 1989 compared to 27% in 1998.

- 64% of the population is serving time for a violent offense (Person or Sex offense).
- Over the 10 year period the number of Sex offenders has increased by 94% and the number of Drug offenders by 92%, representing the two largest growing offense categories in the population.
- While the number of Person offenders increased by 38% from 3,360 on January 1, 1989 to 4,648 on January 1, 1998, the percentage of Person offenders of the total population decreased over the 10 year period from 50% of the population in 1989 to 45% of the population in 1998.
- The number of First Degree Lifers in the population increased 45% from 1993 to 1998. First Degree and Second Degree Lifers overall increased 38% compared to a total population increase of 3% in the same time frame.

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## **Introduction**

The “January 1, 1998 Inmate Statistics” report provides a statistical description of criminally sentenced inmates in Massachusetts Department of Correction (DOC) facilities. In an effort to convey information in a timely manner, the DOC opted to condense the report. Therefore, minimal descriptive text is included. The report consists of mostly data in the form of tables and charts with corresponding numbers, percentages and graphs.

The information in this report is a “snapshot” composition of the inmate population in DOC facilities on January 1, 1998. Throughout the rest of the body of this report, the phrase “in 1998” is substituted for “the population in the DOC on January 1, 1998”.

First, one needs to distinguish between inmates residing “in” DOC facilities and those committed by the courts to the DOC, but serving time in facilities outside of the DOC. The population described in this report is inmates incarcerated as a result of a *criminal* commitment who were in DOC *custody*. This includes **county**, **federal**, and **out-of-state** inmates transferred to a DOC facility who were in DOC *custody* on January 1, 1998 (N = **312**). The breakdown of the total DOC *custody* population (inmates *in* DOC facilities) is as follows:















<b>Age At Incarceration</b>	Jail credits are not included in the calculation of age at incarceration.
<b>Court from Which Committed</b>	Boston Municipal Court is included with the District Court category, as well as other former Municipal courts; District courts are lower courts of all counties.
<b>CRS</b>	Correctional Residential Services.
<b>Current Offense</b>	<p>Inmates may be incarcerated for multiple offenses. The offense reported is that associated with the longest maximum discharge date.</p> <p>Offense labels can be found in the Appendix and are listed in alphabetical order by offense category.</p>
<b>DOC</b>	Massachusetts Department of Correction.
<b>Expiration</b>	Expiration of Sentence.
<b>GCD</b>	Good Conduct Discharge.
<b>HOC</b>	House of Correction - Massachusetts.
<b>Marital Status</b>	The categories “Common Law”, “Cohabitant”, and “Life Partner” are combined into the category labeled “Partner/Live-in” for this report.
<b>Mean</b>	The sum of the values of all the observations in a data set divided by the number of observations.
<b>Median</b>	The point in an array of data which has an equal number of observations above and below it.
<b>Minimum Sentence</b>	Some inmates do not have a minimum sentence, only a maximum sentence. Cases with “No Minimum” term are inmates serving House of Correction (County) or Reformatory sentences and can also be those serving out of state or federal sentences.
<b>MSA</b>	Metropolitan Statistical Area as defined by the Federal Bureau of Census.

**Not Available/NA**

Information that is unavailable for previous years due to changes to definitions/reporting are noted as “Not Available”. Also, missing information is considered “Not Available”.

**Not Reported**

For self-reported variables such as marital status, education, race, place of birth, and address missing information is noted as “Not Reported”.

**PV**

Parole Violation.

**PPREP**

Pre-Parole Residential Environment Program.

**Race/Ethnicity**

Inmates who self-report their race as “White Hispanic” or “Black Hispanic” are combined into the “Hispanic” category for this report.

**Sentence/Sentence Type**

State Prison Sentence

Prior to the “Truth in Sentencing” law, if an offender is sentenced to the State Prison, except for life or as an habitual criminal, the court shall not fix the term of imprisonment, but shall fix a maximum and minimum term for which he/she may be imprisoned. The minimum term shall not be less than two and a half years. All sentences which have a finite maximum term are eligible to have the term reduced by statutory good time, except for most sex offenses, crimes committed while confined and certain “mandatory” sentences.

In the “new law”, all state sentences have a minimum and a maximum term, unless an inmate is sentenced for life or as a habitual criminal. The minimum term is used to determine parole eligibility, and the maximum term is used to determine discharge.

Under both the “old” and “new” sentencing systems, an inmate is discharged from his/her sentence at the expiration of his term, less any statutory or earned good time. Under the “new” system none of the reduction will be attributable to statutory good time

Reformatory Sentence

Prior to the “Truth in Sentencing” law, males and females can be sentenced to a Reformatory sentence, an indefinite term, indicated by a maximum term.

For MCI- Concord, a male not previously sentenced for felony more than three times, convicted of a crime punishable by imprisonment in any correctional institution of the Commonwealth or by imprisonment in a jail or House of Correction may be sentenced for an indefinite term. Concord may confine misdemeanor offenders as well as those who commit felonies.

A female convicted of a crime punishable by imprisonment in a House of Correction, may be sentenced to the Massachusetts Correctional Institution-Framingham. In addition to those women who commit felonies, MCI-Framingham may confine female misdemeanor offenders.

The “new” law eliminates “Concord” (or Framingham) sentences to the state reformatory.

#### House of Correction Sentence

Also known as a “County Sentence”. Prior to the “Truth in Sentencing” law, if an offender is sentenced to the House of Correction, the term shall be two and a half years or less. Parole eligibility and discharge are based on the maximum term of a sentence.

Under the “new” law, discharge on this sentence will change because of the elimination of statutory good time. There is no change in the parole eligibility date.

#### Other State, Federal

This category is used for inmates who were received by the DOC from another state correctional agency or the Federal Bureau of Prisons and are not sentenced under Massachusetts General Law.

#### **Sentence Count**

An inmate is often serving more than one sentence at the same time. This variable is a count of the number of sentences imposed that are entered into the database per inmate. Consecutive sentences that can be identified in the data are subtracted from the count.

**Type of Sentence**

In past reports, this variable has represented the type of sentence received by the court such as Aggregate, Concurrent, Fine, Forthwith, From and After, Simple, or Split. Due to a changes in the database, the Type of Sentence is no longer available in such detail, consequently it is no longer reported. This variable is different from "Sentence Type" which is presented in this report and defined earlier in the Glossary.

**Violent Offense**

Any offense that falls under the Person or Sex Offense categories.

Vehicle Theft	<b>Theft of a Motor Vehicle.</b> Includes larceny of a motor vehicle, boat.
<u>Other Offense</u>	Miscellaneous offenses that are not clearly categorized into one of the other offense categories of Person, Property, Sex or Drug.
Bribery/Corruption	Includes conflict of interest, corruption of public employee.
Carry a Firearm W/Out License	<b>Weapons Violation of Bartley-Fox Gun Law</b> (mandatory 1 year sentence for carrying a firearm without a license.
Decency/Public Peace Crimes	<b>Other Decency/Public Peace Crimes.</b> Includes idle and disorderly, affray, annoying phone calls, disturbing the peace, accosting and annoying persons of the opposite sex, lewd and lascivious, indecent exposure, threat to commit crime, common night walker.
Delivering/Receiving Articles for Inmates	Includes drugs or weapons.
Deriving Support from Prostitute	<b>Deriving Support from Prostitution (pimping).</b> Includes keeping and maintaining house of ill fame, inducing minor to prostitution, prostitutes deriving support from a child.
Escape	Includes attempts, assisting in, accessory to escape.
Leave Scene of Vehicular Accident	<b>Leaving the Scene;</b> motor vehicle accident, personal injury, damage.

Miscellaneous Other Offense	Includes jumping bail, contributing to the delinquency of a minor, threatening tax collector, tax evasion, violation of a civil ordinance, inhaling toxic vapors, home improvement contractor violation/unlicensed, promoting of anarchy, inciting a riot.
Operating Under the Influence W/Injury	<b>Operating Under the Influence with Injury Resulting;</b> liquor, drugs, negligent or recklessness all with serious injury.
Other Motor Vehicle Offenses	Includes violation of automobile law, violation of motor vehicle law, operation without authority of owner after suspension, operation without authority of owner, use without authority, failure to yield right of way to emergency vehicles.
Other Weapons Offense	Includes selling a firearm without a serial number.
OUI, Alcohol or Drugs	<b>Operating a Motor Vehicle Under the Influence of Alcohol or Drugs.</b>
Prostitution	Includes sexual conduct for fee, solicit for prostitution.
Use of a Firearm for Felony	<b>Use of a Firearm to Commit a Felony.</b> Includes possession of a defaced firearm in a felony.
Violation of Restraining Order	Violation of Massachusetts General Law Chapter 209A
<u>Sex Offense</u>	Sex Offenses Against the Person. Consist of Massachusetts General Law Chapter 265 (crimes against the person) and Chapter 272 offenses (crimes against chastity, morality, decency and good order).
Assault With Intent to Rape	Includes attempts to rape.
Indecent A&B on Child < 14	<b>Indecent Assault and Battery on Child under 14.</b> Includes indecent assault and battery on a minor.
Indecent A&B, Victim 14+	<b>Indecent Assault and Battery on Victim, 14 or Older.</b>
Other Sex Offenses	Includes adultery, fornication, open and gross lewdness, drugging for sex.
Rape	Age of victim not specified, or does not fall under a rape of child category.

Includes unnatural acts, lascivious acts, assault to commit unnatural sex acts.
